## The Most Frightening Time of the Year

It's always the same. We make our New Year's resolutions and are doing great and then, out of the blue, comes the temptation above all temptations. Girl Scout Cookies! (cue scary music)

Girl Scouts started in 1912 and by 1917 they were selling cookies to help pay for their activities. In the 1920s and 1930s, the Scouts baked their own sugar cookies and sold them door to door. In 1936, the Girl Scouts licensed the first commercial baker to make the now famous cookies. Now there are two bakeries officially licensed to bake the cookies. Each company must bake Thin Mints, Tagalongs (aka Peanut Butter Sandwich) and Trefoils (aka Shortbread). A total of eight varieties can be baked by each company.

In July 1922, The American Girl magazine, published by Girl Scouts of the USA, featured an article about the cookie sales, including the recipe that had been given to the council's 2,000 Girl Scouts. They estimated the approximate cost of ingredients for 6-7 dozen cookies to be 26 to 36 cents. The cookies, it was suggested, could be sold for 25 or 30 cents per dozen.

In 1933, Girl Scouts in Philadelphia baked cookies and sold them in the city's gas and electric company windows. The price was just 23 cents for a box of 44 cookies or six boxes for \$1.24.

In 1935, scouts in New York raised money selling commercially baked cookies, bought their own cookie cutter in the shape of a trefoil \& used the words "Girl Scout Cookies" on the box. Enthusiasm for the cookies spread and by 1937 more than 125 Girl Scout councils reported holding cookie sales.

Cookies were sold by local councils until WWII when sugar, flour, \& butter shortages led them to sell calendars as an alternative to raise money for activities. In the 1950s, girls were back to cookies and began selling them at tables in shopping malls.

Today all 12 cookie flavors are both kosher \& Halal certified. There are also vegan \& gluten-free varieties, too. Cookies can now be purchased online.

They've come a long way, baby!
